Pastor Mark's Musings

This Season of waiting called Advent, is a very active time in our church. It involves the typical preparations that you might find in your home: decorating with a tree, purchasing presents for loved ones, planning get-togethers for family and friends. For Central, the sanctuary is finely decorated, mittens, hats, and food items are being gathered for God's children, our siblings who are in need of unconditional love from us, planning for Christmas Cabaret, Sunday services, Christmas Eve Services (4 and 11) are in the final stages. This and so much more is part of Advent in our shared lives of Central UMC.

As part of our Advent waiting and living, we will sing,

Silent night, holy night, all is calm, all is bright round yon virgin mother and child. Holy infant, so tender and mild, sleep in heavenly peace, sleep in heavenly peace.

We believe that God is in the midst of it all, hence our singing the good news of a holy night with a holy child. The story began long ago and continues to be alive incarnationally through us in this day and time. We are called to love by doing "all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as you can."

May God give us the passion to do such good of unconditional love which is the good news of Jesus, the Christ.

There is another part of Advent that is so easy to oversee in the busy, gift laden culture that we are a part of. That is the notion of an unwed mother of Middle Eastern origin confiding in her fiancé that she is pregnant with another's baby. The notion of a couple having to leave their home because the government demands they journey just to satisfy expectations of those in control.

It is this part of the message, the recalling of the story that calls us to living in the real world of today, that can bring deeply profound meaning to Christmas in and through Central UMC this year. Some are ready to hear it, proclaim it through word, spoken or sung. Others might not be ready to hear the "rest of the story."

Yet we will proclaim as we sing our way through Advent:

Silent night, holy night, Son of God, love's pure light;
radiant beams from thy holy face with the dawn of redeeming grace,
Jesus, Lord, at thy birth, Jesus, Lord, at thy birth.

May this Advent and Christmas in and through Central make your Christmastide a deeply spiritual time in your life's journey with God.



Echoes of Belize

The Ndjungus Mission Newsletter of November 2018

As you already know, Mbwizu and Nkemba have been assigned to serve as missionaries in Belize where we have arrived in September this year.

The Methodist Church in Belize is part of the Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas (MCCA). The MCCA covers 11 countries and islands organized in 8 Districts. The 8 districts make the Connection led by a "Connectional Bishop"; and each District is led by a "District Bishop". The following 8 Districts together form the MCCA:

Belize / Honduras District

Haiti District

Guyana District

Jamaica District

Bahamas / Turks and Caicos District

Leeward Islands District

Panama / Costa Rica District

South Caribbean District

It is generally accepted that Methodism came to the Caribbean in 1760 with a planter from Antigua, named Nathaniel Gilbert, a lawyer and Speaker of the Antigua House of Assembly. The MCCA was legally established in 1967 by a Deed of Church Order as an autonomous body of Christian believers. Its headquarters are located in Antigua, where Methodism first began in the Caribbean.

The Connectional Conference is the governing body of the MCCA with full legislative powers. It is made up of 22 ministerial representatives and 22 lay representatives from the 8 Districts of the Connection. The Connectional Conference has no administrative authority over the District Conferences who regulate their own affairs within the District as mandated by the constitution. The Conference meets once every three years and is administered by a Connectional President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.

The Connectional Council is the Executive Body of the Connectional Conference and administers the affairs of the Conference between its triennial meetings. The Council meets twice per year. It comprises the 4 Connectional Officers (President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer), 8 District Presidents, 8 District Lay Representatives, the immediate past Vice-President, and the Secretary of the Commission on Ministry.

The Belize/Honduras District (BHD) of the Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas (MCCA) covers the countries of Belize and Honduras since the mid-1800s. They have been able to establish 7 Circuits, 18 Primary schools, 2 High schools, and 1 Junior College. Due to the shortage of ministerial staff that the BHD is presently experiencing, they found it worthy to diversify and empower different offices. A clergy missionary was needed to help oversee a circuit while supporting the staff in the training of lay (continued on next page)

persons (Local Preachers, youth leaders and other church leaders), as well as assist with tutoring and supervising ministerial students who are being trained in the District as Local Presbyters. This is where we fit in.

The objectives of Nkemba's position are: a) Revitalize existing congregations; b) Develop new ministries in the existing ones; and c) Train and deploy lay leadership in the area. Nkemba's full responsibilities include the following:

Fulfill pastoral responsibilities in a circuit with 5 congregations

Offer chaplaincy and regular devotional exercises to 4 primary schools.

Train leaders to promote the involvement in social and ecumenical activities with focus on evangelization, and with an emphasis on tutoring and supervising of probationer local presbyters.

Fulfill other duties as assigned by the Bishop or his/her assignee.

Mbwizu focuses on empowering the Laity, especially women. There are about 22 women groups in the District, about 16 youth organizations, 18 schools, and other opportunities in the wider community for witness – especially in the area of Christian education. Mbwizu's responsibilities include the following:

Help further develop the work among women in the District

Work as a spiritual director for leaders who are involved in work among women, children and youth.

Assist in the ministry to staff, students and parents to educational institutions.

Support the work of the laity in the District.

Preach the Word of God in church and lead worship following an established program in the Stann Creek Circuit.

The Stann Creek circuit where we are assigned comprises 5 preaching points and 4 schools. One of the things that is really pleasing and which is a subject to praise God is the fact that schools here have the preaching of God's word as part of their curriculum. Students have thus the opportunity to be groomed in God's way. It is pleasing to note that the church has still an input on the school program as far as religion is concerned in this country. "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it", Proverbs 22: 6.

The highlight of this past month has been the "Harvest Celebration". Adults, youth and students from all the schools have actively participated in the celebration, bringing joyfully the fruit of their labor to God. The Harvest Day Celebration is one of the fundraising events in the Belize/Honduras Methodist Church.

THE BABY BOX PROJECT

As we await the baby born in a manger we have an opportunity to provide a safe place for other babies in today's world. Central is again partnering with Soaring Unlimited in Haiti to promote the **Baby Box Program**. These boxes are given to mothers in the SOARING UNLIMITED Medical Clinic Birthing Center Program. The new mothers must first participate in the free baby/child care classes offered. Soaring Unlimited has a company that makes the boxes specially manufactured for use in developing countries like Haiti. Each Baby Box is stocked with basic infant needs for the first months of life. They include a blanket, hat, cloth diapers, sleepers, onesies, baby socks, rubber pads, bath towel, wash cloth, soap, bib, etc. Dorothy Frederickson, who founded SOARING UNLIMITED over 20 years ago will be at Central December 9th to tell us more about it. SOARING UNLIMITED appreciates the partnership with Central on this project and that they are able to store many of the items for this project here at Central.

Board of Trustees

The role of the trustees is to support and maintain all of the property belonging to the congregation so that the ministries of the congregation can be effective.

Protecting the Outsides or our buildings: This year the trustees have focused on protecting the outsides of our building. More than \$250,000 for this work came from wills and trusts of Central members who left money or other assets to Central. The major source was from the Floyd and Mame Estes Trust. Most of us have noticed the damage near the ceiling in the NW corner of the sanctuary. This damage was caused by water entering the building.

We have many other places inside the building where we also have similar damages. Because the outside of the building has been repaired, this damage in the sanctuary has been repaired. Other damage inside the buildings will also be repaired. We are in the process of getting bids to have some plaster repairs done.

The major part of protecting the outsides of our church buildings have been exterior masonry repairs, which is called tuckpointing. Work was done in all areas where repairs were needed. In some places, bricks were removed and new bricks replaced. In addition to the tuckpointing, gutters and downspouts were replaced and roof flashing repaired.

Heat tapes melt snow and ice on the edges of the roof. Our heat tapes were in useless condition. Most of the work on installing new heat tapes was funded by the endowment fund of Robert and Sally Swiss. Many of you may recall the painting by Sally of our church buildings, showing some of the outsides and insides of the buildings. Her painting was completed in 1989, the centennial of our original building.

Protecting the Scott Temple House Elevator: The trustees have been gathering information from the city, the state, a plumbing company and Swanson Design Studios on how a sump pump system can be designed to move water from the bottom of an elevator shaft out of the building and into a drainage system. The “rules” have been changed on how such a system must be designed. We are seeking bids for installing a sump pump system.

Supporting Central’s General Budget: In developing a budget for our General Fund for 2018, it was discovered that the amounts of our pledges were not enough to fund our ministries. The Board of Trustees were asked to move about \$14,000 from endowment funds to the General Budget. Later in the year, a review by the Finance Committee found that our 2018 income was less than what we were spending. The Trustees were asked to provide an additional \$15,000 from endowment funds to help reduce the General Fund deficit. The trustees provided the requested funds.
